Internships are six weeks in length and usually extend from early July through mid-August. Grants Or Funding	Minority Dissertation Fellowship: This fellowship is meant to encourage ethnic minorities of the U.S. to complete doctoral degrees in anthropology, thereby increasing diversity in the discipline and/or promoting research on issues of concern among minority populations. The \$10,000 award is granted once a year to a minority student to support the writing phase of their dissertation.
