General Description / Special Programs	Emphasis is on well-rounded training in anthropology with a number of options for special concentration that students may choose. In conjunction with the Milwaukee Public Museum, the department has a Museum Studies Certificate option. There is also an option for a joint Anthropology/Library and Information Sciences Master's degree. There are options for certificates in Forensic Sciences and Celtic Studies at the undergraduate level. The Archaeological Research Laboratory maintains a cultural resource management program, an archaeology field school, and facilities for specialized analysis in lithics, ceramics, osteology, soils, microbotanical, and faunal remains. The biological laboratories have research facilities for forensics, primate genetics and anatomy. The library also maintains access to the Human Relations Area Files.

Phd Requirements	(1) 54 graduate credits beyond bachelor's degree, at least 27 of which must be earned in residence. (2) Mastery of general theory in anthropology. (3) Three required core courses in biological/physical, archaeology and sociocultural anthropology, or equivalent coursework at graduate level, plus an advanced seminar in the student's subfield. (4) Any special skill or language requirement and the time of its fulfillment is determined and attested to by the student's advising committee. (5) Successful completion of Comprehensive Preliminary Exam, based on student's dissertation interests, broadly defined. (6) A research proposal suitable for funding. (7) Field or laboratory research. (8) A dissertation based on research of acceptable quality, duration and scope. (9) A final oral exam (defense of the dissertation).
