General Description / Special Programs	Research plays an important role in the department. Heavy emphasis is placed on prehispanic Native American archaeological studies in the Plains and the Southwestern United States. Instruction is supplemented by research and employment opportunities with the Blackwater Draw Museum, the Blackwater Draw National Historic Landmark archaeological site, and the Agency for Conservation Archaeology. Classes are small and feature hands-on work at the undergraduate and graduate levels. Areas of faculty expertise include: Paleoindian studies, Southwest archaeology, lithic analysis, zooarchaeology, GIS, quantitative methods, historic preservation, cultural resource management, bioarchaeology, ceramic analysis, and cultural anthropology.
