Phd Requirements	48 credit hours of graded course work. Students who enter with an MA degree will usually be able to transfer up to 9 credit hours of graduate course credit towards this total without shortening their time to degree. In order to earn the PhD degree, students must also complete two Critical Reading Essays, successfully defend a dissertation proposal, demonstrate either "competence" in two languages other than English, or "mastery" in one, and write and defend a dissertation based on original research. We expect students to be doing dissertation research, usually away from the University, by the beginning of their fourth year.
