Students majoring in anthropology are required to elect a minimum of 34 credits in anthropology. A minimum of 15 credits must be taken in residence. The capstone course must be taken in residence.

Phd Requirements	90 hours beyond the baccalaureate degree, 30 of which must be earned as dissertation credit. Must demonstrate a proficiency in an approved scholarly language (can be met by three semesters of undergraduate foreign language), oral exam on dissertation, written exam, fieldwork strongly recommended. The MSW is required for the joint PHD degree. For those without a masters in social work (MSW) a total of 129 hours is required for the joint PHD in Anthropology and Social Work AND an MSW.
